We admired the Sogetsu and Ikenobo Ikebana arrangements which showcased beautiful spring flowers and branches. There were also bonsai on display, a few with small blooming flowers. In the main exhibit hall, we enjoyed viewing the plethora of Japanese dolls, kimono, lacquerware and other cultural items. The main exhibit was a traditional red multi-tiered Hina Ningyo doll display with miniature dolls dressed as members of the Imperial Court of Heian Era Japan (794 AD – 1185 AD).

Finally, we had the pleasure of watching a Tea Ceremony demonstration performed by an Omotesenke Tea Ceremony Group, whose members include Forrest Trimbell, Seiko Yoshikawa, Midori Allmeyer, Shelia Phillips, and Yasuyo Kitano. Fittingly, a Hina Matsuri scroll was on display in the tokonoma. As part of our excursion, we also delighted in the rice balls, teriyaki chicken and spam musubi on offer for lunch.
